


The Hatteras 65 Sail Yacht is an expertly crafted centerboard sloop with raised saloon, fullbeam galley, five staterooms and four heads.

As you enter her interior, you are welcomed into a realm of understated elegance.

Lustrous natural woods, a teakand-holly sole in the saloon and companionways, burled countertops, and suede coverings on the saloon seating and companionway bulkheads combine to create an ambience of restrained sophistication. Large, sliding coach house windows, seven opening deck hatches, seven dorade vents and fourteen opening portlights – all screened – admit abundant light and air to contribute a note of bright cheerfulness.

The expansive main saloon has dinette seating for a full complement of guests. To starboard are two upholstered lounge seats, one of which pivots to serve the navigator's station. An AM/FM stereo receiver/cassette deck is standard. Each area of the boat has its own speakers and volume control.



Space has been provided in the saloon for an optional wet bar and icemaker.

The interior's feeling of openness is enhanced by waist-level counters between the saloon and the full-beam galley which has holding plate refrigerator and freezer, gimballed gas stove with oven, microwave oven locker and more than ample storage. Space has also been provided for an optional clothes washer and dryer forward of the galley.

The carpeted owner's suite aft features a queen-sized walk-

around berth, two lighted, cedarlined hanging lockers, dresser and lighted vanity/desk. Single berths are optionally available. The owner's private head aft of the stateroom has a large, fully-enclosed stall shower.

The guest stateroom to starboard of the center companionway has side-by-side single berths, hanging locker, nightstand and its own head with stall shower. The portside guest stateroom duplicates those amenities with over/under single berths. Both staterooms are carpeted.

Two additional staterooms forward have teak-and-holly soles, over/under berths, ample storage and access to a complete forepeak head with stall shower.

Reverse-cycle heating and air conditioning throughout is standard. Each compartment has its own thermostat.

Water capacity is some 300 gallons, and a reverse-osmosis watermaker is available as a factory-installed option.



## The State Of The Art Of Sail

As an experienced large sailboat owner, the moment you step aboard the Hatteras 65 Sail Yacht, you will feel at home.

Her deck layout is uncluttered, functional and on a single level.

The roomy, teak-soled center

cockpit has a fully-instrumented helm console which puts all her strength – under sail or power – at your fingertips.

The forward weather helm, protected by a folding dodger, has full engine controls, space for wind instrumentation, a bench seat and companion seat.

Electric, self-tailing winches give you effortless sail trim and full control of sail furling and centerboard adjustment.

Her sloop rig carries 1,970 square feet of sail with a 100% fore-triangle to allow her to sail responsively in even light to moderate winds. Hood Stoway self-furling on the mainsail and Hood roller-reefing on the 130% genoa are standard. All lines are led aft to the cockpit. Full spinnaker gear

is optionally available.

Twin GM 4-71N diesels provide precise maneuvering in tight quarters. Feathering props provide efficiency under sail. Her cruising range under power is about 1,000 miles at nine knots cruise speed with a fuel capacity of over 700 gallons.

Her draft is 5'10" with the electrically-operated centerboard up for gunkholing in secluded anchorages; 13'10" with the board down for open-ocean stiffness.
